
Annual Report of the Examination Cell (Session 2022-23)

5. Finalization of Question Papers

In view of Learning Outcome Based Education, proper question paper setting is of utmost importance for the quality evaluation. Name of the Paper setters proposed by respective HODs/Deans/Director were sent for the approval of Hon'ble Vice Chancellor through the Controller of Examination.

As per the approval accorded in the meeting of Examination Committee, nominated faculty members prepared the Question papers on the prescribed format for final submission on Exam Portal. On the basis of detailed guidelines, the question papers were prepared by the faculty members.

Format of Question Papers

The question papers comprised of questions from entire syllabus as per the weight-age of the modules of the concerned course unit. In alignment with revised Blooms' Taxonomy, the questions were framed in a way to assess the Learning Outcomes properly and weight-age given to each module of instruction.

In general, question paper was prepared and moderated for 03 hours. In general, the layout of Question Paper for all Courses in Odd and Even Semester was as under:

In addition to the above, question paper pattern for the Bachelor of Science in Agriculture {B. Sc. (Hons)-Agriculture}, Diploma in Agriculture Science, Bachelor of Education (B. Ed), Bachelor of Pharmacy (B.Pharm), Diploma in Pharmacy (D.Pharm) and Bachelor of Architecture (B.Arch.), Diploma in Architecture (D. Arch) and Bachelor of Interior Design (BID) was the same as per the instructions issued by their statutory regularity authorities.

Setting of Question Papers


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Certain important points which were included in the guidelines to ensure the appropriate designing of question paper:

- a) As per the University Norms & Guidelines, the question paper should be designed in such a way that it segregates outstanding students among the students appearing for the examination and grade them in Outstanding, Excellent, Very Good, average & Pass. Outstanding students should be in the range of 5% of total and unsuccessful category of students should not be more than 10% of students.
- b) The question paper setter should decide the weight-age of various Chapters and Units of the syllabus and frame the questions accordingly ensuring the coverage of all Chapters and Units. The questions should be evenly distributed from the prescribed syllabus.
- c) Questions should be based upon course learning outcome as provided in the syllabus and use corresponding cues/verbs of revised Bloom's Taxonomy for examination.
- d) The language of question should be simple. Ambiguous and confusing terminology should not to be used. Construction of simple sentence is desired excluding unnecessary details.
- e) The faculty members must ensure insertion of correct answer and re-check while updating it.
- f) In order to maintain the security, faculty members must ensure resetting of their passwords on portal.
- g) Difficulty level of each question and entire question paper should be analyzed. Generally, 50% to 60% of student (average) should be able to score average grading in the subject. At least 5% of students should only be able to answer one odd question which has significant difficulty level in comparison to filter outstanding students.
- h) The questions in a question Paper should be aligned with the respective sections and duration. Indicated time duration in the templates to complete the question paper should be based upon the time taken by an average student.
- i) The repetitive questions should not be more than 20% in the question paper of the End Semester Examination which has already been asked in the previous test/examination.

To maintain the confidentiality, the whole process of receiving the question paper was done through SRMU Examination Portal.

Moderation of question papers

As per the Question Paper Moderation Guidelines, the question papers were moderated centrally in the Examination Cell in the secured manner under the surveillance of CCTV and in the presence of COE and Deputy COE and then finalized papers were utilized for the conduction. As the Moderation Committees' work is secret in nature, adoption of various security measures ensures confidentiality.

To ensure consistency of question papers within the framework of the syllabus, thereby ensuring consistency of assessment for all students, moderation of Question Paper is being done as per the Guidelines/Checklist. It also ensures that weightage within a module is appropriate and conforms to the blueprint, thereby ensuring fairness, accuracy and consistency in marking.

The committee ensured following guidelines during moderation:

- a) The questions are from within the syllabus and framed in a manner intelligible to the student.


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- b) The coverage and level of the question paper are appropriate and consistent with the curriculum and assessment framework
- c) The prescribed time duration for Question Paper justify with the framed questions given and marks allocation.
- d) The questions are correctly mapped with the appropriate level of Course Learning Outcome CLO and Bloom's Taxonomy (BL).
- e) The question paper contains no ambiguity and the wording of each question is precise, definite and easily understandable
- f) The layout of the QP is in the approved University format and prescribed template has been used.
- g) The question paper model conforms to the Study and Evaluation Scheme of particular program.
- h) The question papers contain required additional information with reference to the relevant questions (for example, tables, graphs, etc).
- i) The Question Paper has no spelling mistakes or other errors.
- j) The instructions in the Section A, B & C are aligned with the questions asked in the QP.

Question Paper is subject to change in case if the suggested changes are more than 25% during the moderation of question paper. However, there was no such change in the Question Paper of the session 2022-23.

6.2 Duration of Papers

On the basis of course credits, duration of examination was specified. For 03, 04, 05 and 06 credits, examination duration was three hours (3 hours) in two shifts (as under) whereas for 01 or 02 credits, examination duration was two hours. Besides this, as per ordinance of statutory bodies, examination duration was specified accordingly.


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First Shift: 09:30 AM – 12:30 PM

Second Shift: 01:00 PM – 04:00 PM

6.4 Evaluation of Answer Sheets

Offline Examination was conducted in both the semesters and coded answer sheets were evaluated by the faculty members centrally in the Examination Cell. Later on, after the processing of answer sheets by the Checker Committee and Head Examiner, award sheets were decoded centrally by the Examination Cell and marks feeding process was completed by the respective faculty members.



10. Scrutiny and Revaluation Process

There is a process of scrutiny as well as re-evaluation for ensuring the students' satisfaction level after the declaration of results. Within 7 days, students can raise their issues related to results on a prescribed format of Scrutiny. After declaration of scrutiny result, if student is not convinced with the report after scrutiny, he/she may apply for revaluation. Four (04) applications were received for scrutiny during session 2022-23 and resolved. Since, students are getting another opportunity to appear in Special Summer Examination/ Improvement Examination to improve their grades; hence grievances are very less in number.

11. Performance Based Scholarship for Session 2022-23

Performance based Scholarship Policy was initiated in the session 2013-14 for encouraging the students to excel their academic performance. Since 2013-14, the University is providing scholarship in form of Fee Incentive and Cash Incentive to the meritorious students as per merit in their respective courses/programmes offered by the University. The detail of Fee Incentive and Cash Incentive which was provided to the students of session 2022-23 is as under:

- (i) **Fee Incentive (Based upon 1st, 2nd, 3rd & 4th Year Result)** is given to the students on securing equal to or more than 7.50 CGPA. In case, if the class strength is equal to or less than 10, then Fee Incentive is given to only those students who have scored equal to or more than CGPA of 8.00. **As per this criteria, total 986 students were provided the fee incentive of Rs. 8,86,500/-.**

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(ii) Fee Incentive (Based upon 1st, 2nd, 3rd & 4th Year Result) is given to the students every year from 1st year up to 4th year to all the branch/course toppers provided he/she secures equal to or more than 8.00 CGPA. In case, if the class strength is equal to or less than 10, then Fee Incentive is given to the branch/course topper who has secured equal to or more than CGPA of 8.50. **As per this criteria, total 91 students were provided the fee incentive of Rs. 3,82,000/-.**

(iii) Cash Incentive (Based upon Final Year Result) is given to all the branch/course toppers provided he/she secures equal to or more than 8.00 CGPA. In case, if the class strength is equal to or less than 10, then Cash Incentive is given to the branch/course topper who has secured equal to or more than CGPA of 9.00. **As per this criteria, total 81 students were provided the fee incentive of Rs. 4,89,500/-**

12. Status of IT integration and Reforms

The Oracle based PeopleSoft ERP provides various modules including student support as Student Campus Community. Implementation of ERP facilitates various processes which are as under:

- Course-wise enrolment of students in every semester
- Regular feeding of attendance and internal Marks
- Online Registration for Examination and Generation of registration cards through Student ERP Portal which can be accessed by the student from anywhere.
- For sanctity of question paper, specially designed Exam Portal provides unique login ID and password to the paper setters for uploading their question paper in secure way for moderation process.
- Creation of grade book, Feeding of end semester marks of the all the Examinations.
- Entire processing of result preparation is completely automated till the final declaration of result on the University website
- Generation of Grade-sheets, Consolidated Transcripts and degrees comprise of QR Code with pertinent information through ERP
- Online Grievance Redressal Portal
- For better and transparent system, Student Portal of PeopleSoft ERP contains all the pertinent details which can be accessed from anywhere by the students/parents.

Student Support Activities:

The University is committed to create student friendly environment and support the students for their career progression, higher studies and placement. Students were continuously facilitated offline and online 24x7 in terms of grade sheets, degrees, certificates, employer verification, and verification for UP scholarship.

Declaration of Results:


Robust use of ERP has decreased numbers of days elapsed in the result declaration considerably. Average days elapsed in result declaration of last 05 sessions was 22.87. In Session 2022-23, average days elapsed in result declaration was 16.2.


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13. Status of NAD DigiLocker Implementation

The vision of National Academic Depository (NAD) was conceptualized to provide an online store house of all academic awards. National Academic Depository (NAD) is a 24X7 online store house of all academic awards viz. certificates, diplomas, degrees, mark-sheets etc. duly digitized and lodged by academic institutions/boards/eligibility assessment bodies. NAD not only ensures easy access to and retrieval of an academic award but also validates and guarantees its authenticity and safe storage.

DigiLocker is a flagship initiative of Ministry of Electronics & IT (MeitY) under Digital India programme. DigiLocker aims at 'Digital Empowerment' of citizen by providing access to authentic digital documents to citizen's digital document wallet. The issued documents in DigiLocker system are deemed to be at par with original physical documents as per Rule 9A of the Information Technology (Preservation and Retention of Information by Intermediaries providing Digital Locker facilities) Rules, 2016 notified on February 8, 2017 vide G.S.R. 711(E).



Degree/Diploma data of total 8743 students (6879 degree and 1864 diploma) had been uploaded on NAD DigiLocker Platform till the session 2021-22 and now the data for session 2022-23 is under preparation.

In the session 2022-23, all the faculty members and students were sensitized regarding NAD DigiLocker and Academic Bank of Credits through orientation programme. As a result of this orientation, 258 students created their ABC ID as on date.
